- Explore historic New Orleans, including The Cabildo at Jackson Square and Congo Square at Louis Armstrong Park
- Stay at the Dauphine Orleans Hotel in the heart of New Orleans's famous French Quarter
- Consider the complicated legacies of Storyville, New Orleans's former red-light district
- Tour the Backstreet Cultural Museum, the Southern Food and Beverage Museum, and the New Orleans African American Museum
- Dig into the Newcomb Center Archives at Tulane University and the LGBT+ Archives Project of Louisiana
- Take a ferry to Algiers Point to view artist Kara Walker's public art project that will coincide with the city's 300th birthday celebrations

- Sample some of New Orleans's most unforgettable foods at Café Du Monde, Domilise's Po-Boys and Brocato's Ice Cream Parlor
- Enjoy a group Jazz Bruch at the Court of Two Sisters, and listen to a live jazz trio in the open air courtyard on Rue Royale

Location: New Orleans, Louisiana

Students will need to be on location in New Orleans on January 4, 2018, for class running January 5, 2018 through January 9, 2018. Students will then be free for two days of composition project development followed by virtual presentations on January 12, 2018

Who should go?

Dates:
