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


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Want to ace your next job interview? Hone your critical thinking skills!

I have always loved the process of brainstorming. Brainstorming is when you write down every thought that comes into your head. Then later, you structure those same thoughts into logical and coherent sentences that explicitly express the information you are trying to convey to the reader.




The Blacker the Berry by Wallace Thurman

Up from Slavery by Booker T. Washington



What advice do you have for students going into a job interview?

First of all, students should research the company's mission statement, vision statement, and strategic goals. Then the student should list his or her knowledge, skills, and abilities that can help that organization meet its goals. Secondly, professional dress is a must.
